Practicing Otolaryngology in Yellowknife

If you are looking for a broad and rewarding ENT practice then the Northwest Territories is for you! You will have an active consult practice as well as a diverse surgical and procedure practice.

We are currently looking for a **permanent Otolaryngologist** to join our staff. As an Otolaryngologist you will provide clinical, emergency, limited on-call coverage, outpatient and inpatient services at Stanton Territorial Hospital (Stanton) in Yellowknife. Yellowknife serves as the referral centre for the Northwest Territories (NWT), as well as the Nunavut Kitikmeot region. This unique practice area gives our Otolaryngologists a total catchment area of 50,000 people covering close to 15% of Canada's geographic land area!

The majority of your time will be spent at Stanton in clinic or in the operating room for emergencies or procedures. You will have a 1:4 on call (average over the year, often done in blocks) schedule to be shared with the other permanent Otolaryngologist or a visiting locum physician. The on call stipend is attractive, yet the volume of calls is not typically demanding. Stanton has a compliment of 2 audiologists and one full-time hearing aid practitioner.



The travel clinics are an important part of the practice and are typically 2-5 days in length depending on the location. These clinics will bring you throughout the NWT to experience the indigenous cultures of Dene, Inuit, and Métis as well as the stunning boreal forest, tundra, and the Mackenzie Delta. You will reach all the way to the fabled Northwest Passage to see the communities of the Arctic in Nunavut. The adventurer in you will appreciate the rural and remote regions you will travel to, as well as the people you will meet in these culturally rich areas of Canada.

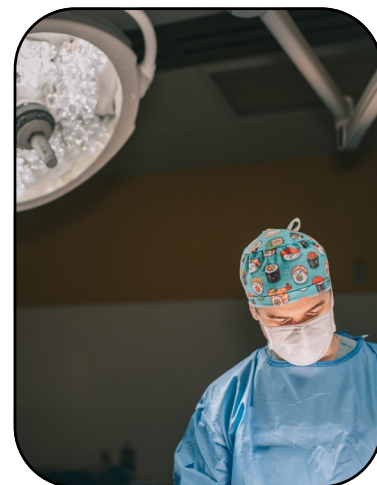

Located above the 60th parallel, the Northwest Territories awaits with seemingly endless lakes and unmatched vistas. Home to approximately 45,000 people in 33 communities, the Northwest Territories is over 1.34 million square kilometers in size.

On the shores of Great Slave Lake lies the capital city of Yellowknife (population 21,000). The 'urban' centre of the territory, Yellowknife boasts all the amenities of a big city, while maintaining its small town charm, with outdoor wilderness adventures just minutes away.

With easy access to nature and long summer days, our physicians and their families take full advantage of the overnight, weekend, and week-long paddling, sailing, and camping opportunities available to them. Music and festival lovers can enjoy the always eagerly anticipated Folk on the Rocks Music Festival, the Ramble and Ride Festival, and the weekly Farmer's Market at City Hall throughout the summer. Fishing enthusiasts will never be short of new lakes to explore, golfers can tee-off under the midnight sun, and white-water paddling lovers can spend a glorious August weekend at the Slave River Paddlefest in Fort Smith to enjoy our world-class rapids.



Yellowknife winters welcome the stunning northern lights, along with a whole new host of family-friendly activities and adventures. This includes exploring endless frozen lakes and trails for skiing, snowshoeing, snowmobiling, and even biking, as part of our every-growing fat bike community. In March, the doors to the world-famous Snow Castle on Great Slave Lake open to the public, with the Long-John Jamboree taking place just outside the castle walls.



Need a break from the outdoors? Northerners are renowned for their innovative spirit, especially during the cold winter months, so there's never a shortage of things to do. Indoor activities include including dance, arts, choir, and theatre community organizations, the Dead North Film Festival, and local and international theatre and music performances at the Northern Arts and Cultural Centre. Our welcoming residents also love their pot-lucks and cozy get-togethers, with an active board games community (and board game store) for some quality friends and family time.

Year round, Yellowknife is host to dozens of delicious dining opportunities ranging from Thai, to Korean, to Japanese, to Ethiopian. Beer aficionados can try out some our locally brewed beers at the Woodyard in Old Town. Yellowknife has an indoor running track, three ice-rinks, an incredible new aquatic centre (2025) with a 25-metre swimming pool and water slides, a climbing wall, a curling rink, and two indoor fields. There are also a variety of gyms, yoga, and boxing classes. For the team sports enthusiast, you can easily fill your days playing in any number of leagues including slo-pitch, soccer, pickle ball, Ultimate, volleyball, hockey, basketball... just to name a few. And the individual and team sports options available for youth are even more extensive!
