Jada Beck, Medical Student and Bursary Recipient

After completing her Bachelor of Science in Kinesiology, Jada Beck returned to her hometown of Hay River, NWT during the COVID-19 Pandemic. It wasn't long before Jada recognized the fact that residents were relying heavily on nurse practitioners as visits from physicians were few and far between.

Seeing the need for physicians in her community drove Jada to apply to medical school. Jada is currently enrolled in the Undergraduate Medical Education Program at Queen's University, on her journey to graduate as a Doctor of Medicine.

Medical school is an expensive endeavor. Jada received some funding from the Métis Nation and Student Financial Assistance, however it was not enough to cover all her expenses. The NWT HSS Bursary Program proved to be a valuable support for Jada.

"Once I saw that it [the Bursary Program] was for northern students pursuing Health and Social Services, I applied immediately... so far, my experience with the program has been amazing. It's fast and easy to apply."

In her free time, Jada advocates for Indigenous students. She joined the Indigenous Health Standing Committee, a group of Indigenous Medical Students that come together to connect with their culture, advocate for Truth and Reconciliation, and fundraise for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Peoples. Jada is one of three Indigenous students in her class of 108. Her goal is to make Indigenous students feel welcomed, recognized, and celebrated, giving comfort and encouragement to Indigenous students applying to medical school.

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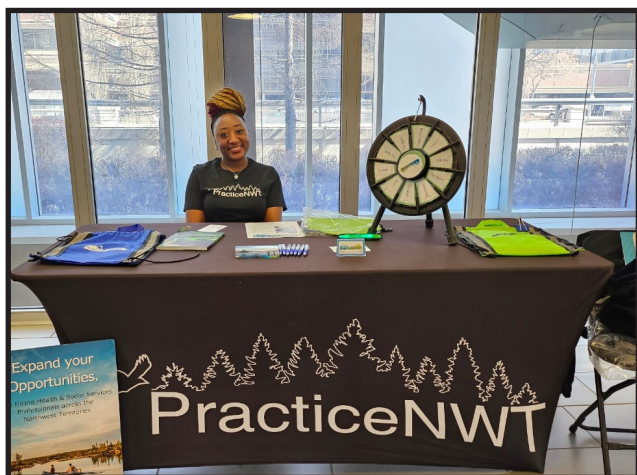
University of Toronto's Annual Speech Language Pathology Job Fair

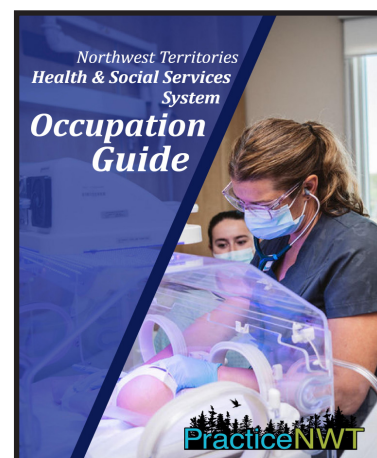

Personal Support Worker Program... From Home

Personal Support Workers (PSW) are pillars in the healthcare system, working to promote and maintain the personal care, mobility, and psychological well being of elders so they may remain independent for as long as possible.

Over the last 5 years the Personal Support Worker program at the Aurora College School of Health and Human Services has adapted to increase its accessibility across the NWT.

Wanda Roberts, Program Head of Health Programs at Aurora College, saw a need for distance education in small communities throughout the territory.

"[The PSW Program] is breaking down barriers by providing a distance option... it's the only health program offering the opportunity to learn at home." – Wanda

How are those barriers being broken down?

- Theory classes are now available online.
- The practice hours can often be performed in the student's home community or a nearby regional hub.
- If a student has current experience working as a PSW, Aurora College can recognize prior experience as credit, shortening or even eliminating the 400 practice hours required for graduation.
- Students can take a few classes at a time, so they can continue to work while studying.

Shannon Coleman is a member of the Salt River First Nation and a graduate from the distance education PSW program. "I quite enjoyed the distance option for there is no distractions from others," says Shannon.

Shannon shared that she was proud of herself for being able to study while continuing to work. She also noted how grateful she was for the support she received from her instructors, co-workers, family, and the patients.

Amy Lea, Senior Instructor for the PSW Program, and Wanda were in Fort Simpson when they made a surprise visit to recent distance program graduate, Grecia Sofia Dewar. Wanda and Amy were welcomed with a big smile and a warm hug from Grecia. For Wanda and Amy, this was confirmation their program was making a difference in people's

lives, even from a distance.

Grecia speaks highly of her instructors. "Both Wanda and Amy have been extremely helpful in supporting me throughout the program. When I thought I was not able to do something they would always encourage me to reach out."

Grecia chose the distance education option as she has a family and did not want to have to move them to a new city. She could complete her studies while continuing to live and work in Fort Simpson.

Amy notes "If you are looking for a job with meaning, this [becoming a PSW] is a beautiful way to do that."

Are you considering becoming a PSW? Amy shared that students who are interested in this career have a caring nature, they want to support their community.

NWT Health and Social Services Bursary Program Now Accepting Applications for 2024/25 School Year

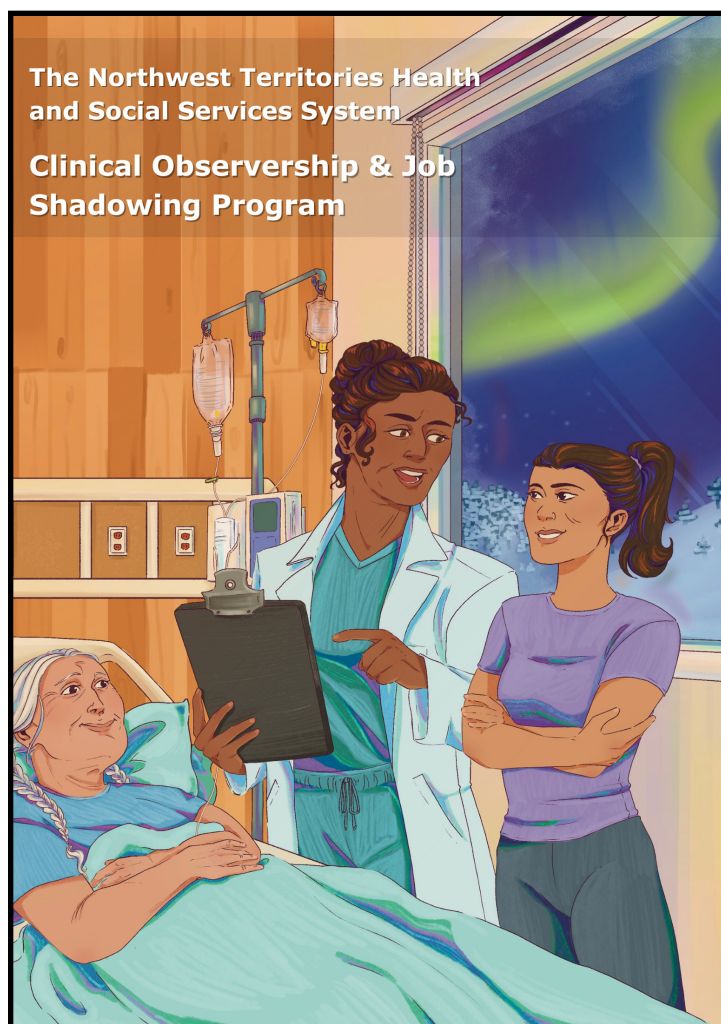
The NWT Health and Social Services System Bursary Program is available for application to NWT students pursuing an education in a health and social services-related field.
